Narrative Summary from Comprehensive Needs Assessment:

Loranger Middle School has a population of 586 students in grades 5th - 8th. Our student population is 62.12% White/ Non Hispanic, 33.89% Black and 6.83% Hispanic and .17% Asian. We have 39.59% in the Free/Reduced lunch program. Loranger has a Special Education population of 12.12% and a 504 population of 10.58%. 39.59% of our students are Economically Disadvantaged. After analyzing 2021-2022 LEAP Scores for Loranger's Academic and Subgroup data, here are the findings. In the 2020-2021 school year, Loranger Middle School's Leap Assessment Index went from 46.6 to 50.2 in the 2021-2022 school year. This data shows an increase of 3.6 points. In the 2020-2021 school year, the ELA Assessment Index went from 59.6 to 68.8 in the 2021-2022 school year. This data shows an increase of 9.2 points. In the 2020-2021 school year, the Math Assessment Index went from 36.2 to 40.1 in the 2021-2022 school year. This data shows an increase of 3.9 points. In the 2020-2021 school year, the Science Assessment Index went from 43.8 to 43.3 in the 2021-2022 school year. This data shows a decrease of .5 points. In the 2020-2021 school year, the Social Studies Assessment Index went from 43.8 to 39.7 in the 2021-2022 school year. This data shows a decrease of 4.1 points.

Special Education: Identified students with disabilities receive all services specified on their IEP through a combination of GFF, IDEA, Title I, or Title III funding.

English as a Second Language (ESL): Identified LEP students receive services from ESL teachers, paraprofessionals, and/or tutors at their school site. These services are paid for through GFF, Title I, Title III, and Title III Immigrant Funds.

21st Century Programs: Students in participating schools are entitled to attend the 21st Century afterschool programs during the school year and during the summer.
